

News & Events

- SSV EMS Funding:** AFD received \$11,000 in funding to purchase ballistic protective safety gear. 10 sets in total will ensure all on duty AFD personnel will be protected from hostile/violent emergencies.
- Personnel Changes:** Fire Captain John Williamson, Firefighter Austin Kiefer, & Firefighter Jeremy Johnson all left AFD for other agencies. Williamson joined the Placer Hills Fire Protection District as a Battalion Chief, Kiefer joined the Stockton Fire Department as a Firefighter/Paramedic, and Johnson joined the City of Woodland Fire Department as a Firefighter.
- Internal S-290 Course:** Captain Croft provided eight Auburn Fire Department employees with 32 hours of S-290 Intermediate Wildland Fire Behavior Instruction. Employees received certification from the State Fire Marshall's Office and are better prepared to safely respond to vegetation fires throughout California.

Significant Emergency Incidents

HAZMAT

13079 Earhart Avenue, January 6th – At 7:25pm Auburn Fire received notification that Placer County Fire/CALFIRE Station 180 was responding to a reported HAZMAT at 13079 Earhart Avenue. Battalion 1215 responded to the incident as an Agency Representative and met with Station 180 resources who advised a 55 gallon drum ruptured and spilled 10+ gallons of sulfuric/nitric acid inside a manufacturing facility. The Station 180 resources mitigated the incident and the facility was shut down by management for clean-up and inspection by Placer County Environmental Health. No injuries were incurred.

Agency Assist

Auburn Ravine Road and Epperle Lane, January 6th – At 9:12pm Auburn Fire was requested to assist Auburn Police Department with a flooding call at the intersection of Auburn Ravine Road and Epperle Lane. Engine 1285 responded and found a significant water leak emanating from beneath the roadway. Battalion 1215 responded, assumed Incident Command and requested Engine 1284 respond to assist checking businesses for water intrusion and owner notification. PCWA arrived at scene and secured the water leak. Public Works arrived and coordinated road closures with PCWA and APD. The water leak impacted 7 commercial water services for 12+ hours, forcing some business to remain closed on January 7th.

Vehicle Accident

East Bound Interstate 80 West of the City Limits, January 19th – At 7:15am Auburn Fire resources responded to a vehicle accident on East Bound I-80 just west of the city limits. Auburn Fire resources arrived and found a single commercial tractor/trailer on its side with major damage and multiple lanes of traffic blocked with trash. The driver was transported to Sutter Roseville with moderate injuries. The tractor/trailer was leaking several fluids from the engine compartment. Firefighters dammed and contained the fluids. Proper notifications were made to regulatory agencies. East bound I-80 traffic was reduced to one lane of traffic until approximately 1:00pm causing significant issues in the greater Auburn area.

Vehicle Accident

W/B I-80 @ Nevada St, February 2nd – At 11:56am Auburn Fire resources responded to a vehicle accident on I-80 near Nevada St. Auburn Fire resources found one commercial tractor/trailer on its side and one pickup truck with significant damage. One patient was transported to Sutter Roseville with moderate injuries. The tractor/trailer was leaking several fluids from the engine compartment. Firefighters dammed and diverted the fluids away from the Auburn Ravine. CAL Trans facilitated the removal of remaining contaminants. Proper notifications were made to regulatory agencies.

Multi-Vehicle Accident

Grass Valley Highway North of Palm Avenue, February 5th – At 6:25pm Auburn Fire units responded to a multi-vehicle accident on Highway 49 near Palm Avenue. Auburn Fire resources found Law Enforcement out with a four vehicle accident impacting all north and south bound lanes of traffic. Two occupants were injured, one required extrication. CALFIRE/Placer County Fire Station 180 was requested to respond to the incident for manpower. The trapped occupant was extricated and AMR transported both patients to Sutter Roseville Medical Center. Fire units assisted Law Enforcement with scene security, traffic control and suppression stand-by. Traffic was diverted around the Highway 49 Business District while this incident was mitigated.

Fire Investigation

City of Grass Valley, February 9th – Auburn Fire Investigator Captain Croft, (Prevention 1221) responded as a mutual aid request, to Grass Valley to assist with a residential fire investigation resulting in a fatality. P1221 arrived at scene and assisted Nevada County Consolidated Fire Department Investigators with initial fire cause and origin operations.

Medical Aid, Using Advanced Scope EMT Skills

400 Elm Avenue, February 16th – Auburn Fire Engines 1283 and 1285 responded to a medical aid for a person down on the sidewalk, unconscious, and with slow respirations. Engine 1285 arrived at scene and determined that the medical emergency was due to an overdose of an unknown narcotic, Advanced EMT procedures were utilized with Engine 1285 administering NARCAN to the patient. Both Auburn units then assisted AMR 162 with a rapid patient assessment and transport to Sutter Auburn Hospital with 2 Fire Fighters on board, giving continuous patient care and supporting AMR 162's medic.
